



An intimate portrait of creativity and womanhood and the rarely seen intricacies and shifting contrasts of Iranian society.

Award-winning documentary

A powerful documentary that chronicles the journey of 14 refugee youth who take the stage to depict their families' experiences during the on-going Burmese genocide of Rohingya Muslims. A courageous act of resistance, these youth show the world that they will not be silenced, they will not be forgotten.



There's Something In The Water (2019)


A Canadian documentary film

Elliot Page brings attention to the injustices and injuries caused by environmental racism in his home province, in this urgent documentary on Indigenous and African Nova Scotian women fighting to protect their communities, their land, and their futures.



Seaspiracy (2021)

A 2021 documentary film about the environmental impact of fishing. Seaspiracy examines various human impacts on marine life, including plastic marine debris, ghost nets and overfishing. Director Ali Tabrizi explores the idea of sustainable fishing and marine ecosystem destruction.



Period, End of Sentence, (2018)

Winner of the Academy Award for Best Documentary (Short Subject)

Inspired by the life of Arunachalam Muruganantham, this film follows a group of Indian women as they lead a quiet sexual revolution, learning how to operate a machine that makes low-cost. biodegradable sanitary pads, which they sell to other women at affordable prices.




I Am Belmaya (2021)

An inspirational tale of rebellion. courage and hope in patriarchal Nepal, Belmaya Napli-silenced and subjugated for most of her life-takes up the movie camera to tell her story her way. Spanning 14 years, this film depicts Belmava's transformational journey as she stands up to her husband and society, and reclaims her voice through filmmaking.



The True Cost (2015)

This is a story about the clothes we wear, the people who make them, and the impact the industry is having on our world. The price of clothing has been decreasing for decades, while the human and environmental costs have grown dramatically. Who really pays the price for our clothing?



David Attenborough: A Life On Our Planet (2020)

In his 93 years, David Attenborough has visited every continent on the globe. Now, for the first time he reflects upon both the defining moments of his lifetime as a naturalist and the devastating changes he has seen. David Attenborough: A Life On Our Planet is a first-hand account of humanity's impact on nature and a message of hope for future generations.







- group work, decision making, connection to self and others, building empathy, communication




What is poverty? What does it mean to live in poverty?




Learning Objective

- to transform thinking about & understanding of child labour, exploitation and the right to good working conditions

Skills

- Critical thinking, decision making, taking action, connection to self and others, building empathy, communication



The Labour Spectrum activity:

- Profiles of children from around the globe
- Students order profiles on a linear spectrum based on their interpretations of fairness
- Discuss which children from the profiles should be allowed to work and which should not

Good / Fair work Bad / Unfair work

Child Labour Example

Jessica, Chile

Jessica is 16 years old. She works one night a week after school and on Saturdays at a trendy clothing store downtown. Most of her pay cheque is spent on clothes from the store and going out with her friends. Her parents didn't want her to work, but she insisted. They made a deal that she is allowed to keep working as long as her grades stay the same or improve.



Child Labour Example

Jaime, Colombia

Jaime is a 10-year-old mine worker in Amaga, a tiny town about an hour from one of Colombia's larger cities. The area is very poor and many families depend on their children's pay from working in the mines. Jaime wakes up at 4 a.m. and works up to 10 hours below ground in the mines. Jaime has to haul heavy sacks of coal up narrow slippery tunnels. He is paid \$18 per week.




Child Labour Interpretation

- What makes a good workplace for a child?
- Why do some children have jobs?
- What could be done so fewer children have to work?
- What is acceptable/unacceptable for child labour?

(Consent, safety, paid fairly, appropriate jobs/hours for their age, does not interfere with education)


